READING	WRITING	MATHS
<p>Enjoy reading any text, anywhere! Read road signs, signs in shops, comics, newspapers, fiction and non fiction books.</p> <p>Remember to use your local library for a wide variety of books, as well as other activities from time to time.</p> <p>Den reading – add new fun to reading, create a den with your child as a place to read their favourite or new books, remember a torch!</p> <p>Cooking – reading and maths meet lots of fun!</p> <p>Comprehension: Use ideas from RM home readers with any books you share!</p>	<p>Take any opportunity to encourage some independent writing - Write cards, lists, stories, label pictures</p> <p>Write a simple holiday diary or make a general or holiday scrapbook</p> <p>Write some simple book reviews – create your own book review journal</p> <p>Write a different ending to a story.</p> <p>Write a description of a character from a story</p> <p>Use any interesting picture as the starting point for writing..</p> <p>Story maps – create a map of what happens in a well known story and label it</p>	<p>Maths too can be done anytime, anywhere!</p> <p>Numbers on signs, prices when shopping, timetables, money, board games. Shapes too are all around. Name them, describe them.</p> <p>Measuring is also very practical – length, weight and capacity. Use cooking and other activities to use and develop these skills in the ‘real’ world!</p>

<p>Copy of first 100 high frequency words attached.</p> <p>Could make bingo boards with words on, you read word and players have to cover as many as possible.</p> <p>Make pairs cards with same word on and play memory game of pairs.</p>	<p>Motor skills are important for writing.</p> <p>Gross motor activities: Any ball activities, especially throwing and catching. Rolling and twisting hoops, hopscotch, balancing, climbing, hopping, skipping, jumping.</p> <p>Fine motor activities: Threading, popping bubble wrap, using squeeze bottle to form letters in water (in the better weather outside!), spinning tops, pegs, chopsticks, picking small things out of sand, sorting small objects (eg buttons, paperclips, beads), cutting, doing up buttons and laces.</p>	<p>Dominoes – ideas attached!</p> <p>Simple Sudoku (examples on CBeebies website, games, numberjacks)</p> <p>Money – sort real coins; add real coins; make amounts to match a price</p> <p>Number bonds – practice pairs of numbers using fingers initially, and build up to mental recall. Can be done any time, any where!</p>
